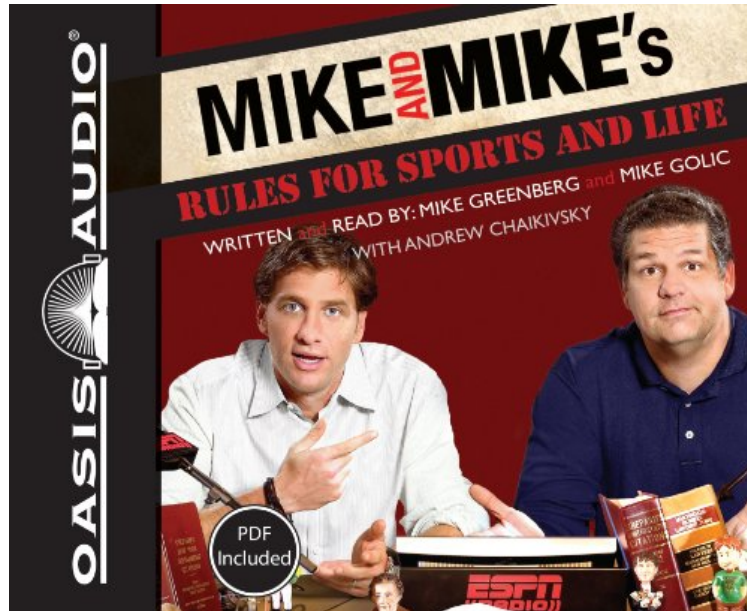

Every morning more than three million listeners tune in to Mike and Mike in the Morning on ESPN Radio mostly to hear the Mikes (Golic and Greenberg) riotous back-and-forth on everything from why baseball managers should dress like real people to how to lose a fight with the wife with dignity. In Mike and Mike's Rules for Sports and Life, the beloved mic jockeys put their unique stamp on, well, the rules for sports and life. In years on the road, in the studio, and at home, Greenberg and Golic have learned that it's all about the big stuff: separating order from chaos, ensuring our survival as a species, and keeping peace. If you're one of Golic and Greenberg's legions of followers, you probably can't get enough of this sort of provocative, hilarious, and occasionally obsessive stuff. And if you're one of those fans who live by the rule There oughta be a rule, then Mike and Mike's Rules for Sports and Life is the audio book for you.

From Booklist The Mikes are the very popular hosts of ESPN Radio's early morning sports talk show. Part of what makes the show work is the hosts' contrary personalities. Golic is an articulate, no-nonsense former NFL defensive lineman. Greenberg is a sports-savvy, self-described metrosexual whose mind is filled with inherently worthless

minutiae that becomes valuable because, well, he makes his living as a sports yakker. The book recounts some of their best on-air discussions in transcript form and conveys the ubiquitous silliness that drives the show. There are details of their off-air lives and contrived misadventures, such as the time Greeny offered use of Golic's car to the show's listeners. Formatted as a faux self-help book, the extensively illustrated volume includes sections on why athletes will one day rule the world and why college football is the most philosophical of sports. The show's millions of fans will surely enjoy this print version, and other sports fans who happen upon the book will be prompted to spin their radio dials and have a listen.
