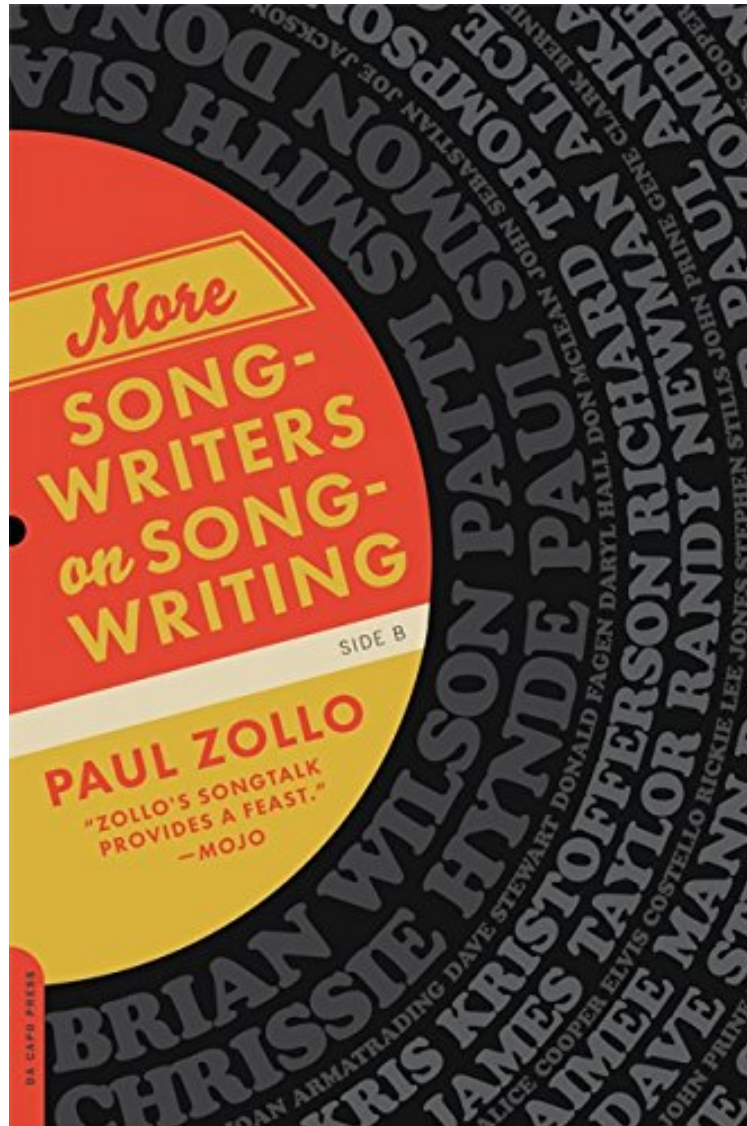

Brian Wilson? Randy Newman? James Taylor? Of course. ever wonder what it might be like to sit with them and some 40 other writers of our time? This is the substance of what Zollo has tackled. I knew that I would love this book as I am fully impressed by the first version. Zollo puts you in the room with him as he tries to ferret out the mystery of song writing. As one skilled in the

craft, he has an inside edge when seeking the heart of the mystery. As I read this edition (still in the process), I could feel the awkwardness of Brian Wilson as though I were present. I'm a huge James Taylor fan and read James' autobiography years ago. There are portions of Zollo's interview with James that took me to a place unreached in James' own bio. The exchanges are cordial and very respectful of each artist. Zollo has done his homework and approaches each interview ready. He knows the material and is able to surgically cull the essence of each verse by each artist. I've learned a lot in reading this book (as a continuation of the first volume) and have been exposed to some folks I didn't know. I enjoy grabbing it and choosing a particular songwriter and having a little visit. Then, I can return at a later time to explore the next artist. There's not anything that I can think to suggest to improve on this project. It's highly readable, it's incisive and opens doors as Zollo tries to get answers to settle his curiosity. I was struck this morning as I was reading Richard Thompson's interview from 2009 where Zollo inquires: And then is it pretty clear to you what chords will go with that melody, or do you try different things? Thompson responds: I think it's usually clear. Sometimes it changes, but it doesn't usually change very much. That's interesting it's something I've never really considered before. Usually the first way you hear it is the harmony you end up using. As I read this I thought it interesting indeed that Zollo had touched on something that Thompson had not considered before. This is only one example of many where Zollo opens it up. I think it helps if the reader is a musician and/or writer themselves as many of the references are spoken musician to musician. If one is only the least bit interested in the process of song writing, this book is a must. I've recommended it to all my friends and the feedback I've gotten is unanimous. Very well done. I look forward to whatever is next on Zollo's list as I have become a big fan. Treat yourself or someone you know would love it. It's the Holidays - go big!

By Edisaurus I've owned the first volume of *Songwriters on Songwriting* for many years, (as well as other Paul Zollo books) and have given it to friends who all love it. I've also updated my own copy when more interviews were added to the original. So all of the fans of this book were very excited about the prospect of another volume of all-new interviews and *More Songwriters on Songwriting* was worth the wait! For decades, Paul Zollo has interviewed most of the great songwriters, so there are many household names like Paul Simon, Randy Newman and Elvis Costello. But the interviews I looked forward to the most were with the lesser-known...some of my favorite songwriters like Joe Jackson and Difford and Tilbrook. Because Paul Zollo is a songwriter himself, he has an innate understanding and ability to communicate on the same level with these artists and go very deeply into their creative process. You can tell that he must do an immense amount of preparation to familiarize himself with each writer's work. As you read the interviews, you understand what a personal endeavor it is to write a song; that there is no one method and everyone's approach may be different. Although I'm not a songwriter, I am in a creative profession and found many similarities between my work processes and theirs, and therefore it was very inspiring! *More Songwriters on Songwriting* is eye-opening, fun and gives you a deeper appreciation of the songs we all love. Everyone will enjoy reading the thoughts of their favorite writers and may also discover some new ones to love!

Hennessy This book holds up well on its own, however it falls short of the mark compared to the original "Songwriters on Songwriting". The information contained is okay but relies heavily on a formulaic list of (sometimes absurd) questions. Paul Zollo has interviewed a rather impressive list of songwriters in both books. It is fun reading about ALL the artists whether you know of them or not. It seems that Paul loves all of these people and some of them he truly adores. He tends to gush and slobber out his affection on all of them. I suppose this is probably necessary if he is going to get any depth to his interviews. If you like this book you owe it to yourself to read the original "Songwriters" book also.
